#### PASTOR'S THOUGHTS

#### Physically Letting Go and Spiritually Getting On

During the Epiphany Season we watched the crowds steadily increase as Jesus proclaimed His message of healing and wholeness. As we continued in the Season of Lent we start to see those crowds begin to wane. One by one, the circles around Jesus start to disintegrate as they begin to comprehend that this Jesus will not conform to their understanding of a political or material messiah.

The Season of Lent is a time when we see our Savior physically letting go of His earthly ministry in order to spiritually get on with His Father's plan to restore the relationship between Himself and His rebellious creation. Step by solemn step Jesus begins His march to Jerusalem. With each step He consoles His followers about the events which will soon unfold. With each step He comforts His followers that only through the cross and grave will come perfect healing and eternal life.

I want to encourage each of you to walk with our Savior and fellow brothers and sisters as we join Him on the journey to Jerusalem. Enjoy some good food and thoughtful conversations during our mid-week fellowship and worship. Join in the cheering our Savior as He enters Jerusalem on Palm Sunday. Confess our jeering with the crowds on Good Friday. Celebrate running from the empty tomb to share the victory on Easter Sunday. And don't forget to invite a friend or a neighbor to come celebrate with us.

#### Read Through the Bible in a Year Calendar

Scripture reading suggestions:

1) It's important to find yourself a regular time and quiet place to read the Bible; reading Scripture regularly and habitually gradually deepens your relationship with God. Remember, keep it simple. This is only a guide, not a rule. Use this to help hear and study God's Word.

2) Begin by praying. One very simple and good prayer to use is Psalm 119:18 "Open my eyes, so that I may see the wonderful truths in your Word."

3) Take some time to be quiet with God, to think about what you read yesterday, and to think again about what you learned from that reading.

4) Read the passage for the day. Think what the passage tells you. Some questions worth asking yourself are: 1. Does this passage tell a story? Or is it a prayer or a poem, or perhaps part of a letter? 2. What is it mainly about? 3. Does it tell me something about what God is like? Does it tell me something about how to live in response to God's love and plan for me?

5) Try to summarize what you have learned from the passage.

6) Is there something here that I don't understand, that I need to think about a lot more, or talk to someone else about, or perhaps even look for more information?

7) Take some more time to be quiet with God-don't just ask these questions once over, but think about them for a while. Think again about yesterday's reading-how do the things you learned yesterday fit with what you learned today?

8) Keeping a notebook of what you learn can be very helpful.

9) Did you know that.....When you carry the Bible, Satan has a headache. When he sees you reading it, he faints. Let's read the Bible every day so he keeps on fainting. Maybe one day he'll have a stroke and never wake up.

I received the following in an email recently. We should all be aware of our continuing mission with the collection of eyeglasses for MOST ministries. I believe it gives a great history of the program as it began. As you read this contemplate to yourself, does reaching out to others or the plan of doing so affect you? Prayer in these circumstances is a must and listening to the answers is required. I think of when I started my adventure with the Lutheran Women in Mission. I think I listened for the answers as I prayed for God to lead me in the direction of mission work. From 7<sup>th</sup> grade I knew I wanted to continue a legacy in honor of my friend's mom, Enola. At her funeral there were so many women dressed in purple. I didn't understand. Why purple? My mom briefly explained they were members of LWML and Enola was very involved in the group. I knew I wanted to be a part of this sisterhood but didn't know much more about it until I came to King of Kings. I applied to be a Young Women's Representative for the 2003 national convention. It was with this experience that started the development of my passion. Have I been 100% perfect? No. But prayer and taking the hints given to me from God I know I am steadily making a difference. So, with this understanding I give you this amazing story. Let it feed your passion for the mission field and find a way to help those still needing to hear God's message.

#### Coping with the Early Years of Eyeglass Ministry

Gayle Sommerfeld has written in her memoir, *Beyond Sight: God's Vision for Using Ordinary People to Impact the World*, about her experience dispensing eyeglasses in MOST Ministries' second country of outreach, Panama. In the area where the clinic was held, there was a nearby village of Kuna natives who had never used eyeglasses (someone commented, "They must have perfect vision!")

Nevertheless, the team reached out to the Kuna village, after which four village leaders scouted the clinic. Their verdict obviously passed muster, because the next day, 80 Kuna appeared in line to be tested for eyeglasses! Gayle was overjoyed; her husband Don was not. What to Gayle was a gift from God, an opportunity to share the Gospel with this group, was stress and anxiety for Don. How could the team possibly test and fit glasses on this entire group? What would the team do when evening came?

In those first years of the eyeglass ministry, the testing and dispensing was tedious, to say the least, so no wonder Don's management style was upset when the size of the crowd created stress. God had an answer for that problem. A few days later, while still in Panama, Don "resigned" his role as a team leader, because he felt a new call from God. During his private devotion time, God told him "I'm giving you the eyeglass ministry. Let me lead you, don't run ahead of me and don't lag behind." When Don arrived home from Panama, he put his time and talents to work managing the preparation of eyeglasses for teams and finding the best way to measure vision in the field.

From the first, fledgling, eyeglass mission in 1990 with two paper bags, one for weak and the other for strong prescriptions, the ministry has grown to sending about 3,000 pairs of prescription eyeglasses with each team. They are carefully sorted, measured, labeled, and packed for safe travel, so a team can serve 200 or more individuals a day on the field. We are thankful that upwards of 100,000 eyeglasses are donated to MOST Ministries each year. An army of volunteers puts in an average of 1,700 hours per year to be sure that the best 45,000 of these donated eyeglasses are ready each year for distribution by our mission teams.

Don reflects, "As God has led us, this eyeglass ministry has continued to flourish."
